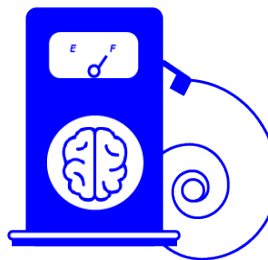

Adverbs and Adjectives

What's the difference?



Brain Fueled

Adjectives are words used to describe or modify a **noun** or **pronoun**.

Adjectives answer the questions:

How many? James sang *several* songs.

What kind? James sang a *beautiful* song.

Which? James sang the most *popular* song.

Adverbs are words used to describe or modify a **verb**, **adjective** or another **adverb**.

Adverbs answer the questions:

How? James danced *gleefully*.

Where? James danced *regularly*.

When? James danced *yesterday*.

Some adverbs and adjectives have the same form:
fast, hard, late, early, daily, weekly, monthly...

Adjectives

He caught a **fast** ball.
He caught the **early** train.
She's a **hard** worker.
The bus is always **late**.
My **daily** newspaper costs is here.

Adverbs

He ran **fast** to catch the ball.
He always arrives **early**.
She works **hard**.
I arrived home **late**.
They swim **daily**.

Many words have both an adjective and adverb form.

Adjective

Happy kids
Smooth rock
Good night
Casual dress
Quick meeting
Real butter

Adverb

Playing *happily*
Running *smoothly*
Eating *well*
Dressing *casually*
Talking *quickly*
Really hot
